### WORSHIP SCHEDULE

## Overbrook Presbyterian Church



**Maundy Thursday – March 29:** Our Maundy Thursday worship service will begin at 7:00 p.m. and will include the sacrament of the Lord’s Supper—the celebration of the last meal that Jesus shared with his disciples the evening before his arrest and crucifixion. Pastor Bruce Gillette’s sermon is titled “Something to Treasure.” Come and share in this special time of worship with Jesus’ special meal.



**Good Friday – March 30:** 1) Overbrook’s Good Friday Evening Service: During this 7:00 p.m. worship service we will remember Jesus’ death on the cross with special music that will feature John Stainer’s *Crucifixion*, an hour-long work that captures the majesty and agony of Holy Week, with soloists Toffer Mihalka, tenor, and Matthew Lulofs, baritone. The service will also include traditional Good Friday hymns. 2) Join us Good Friday at noon for a joint service hosted nearby at St. Thomas African Episcopal Church. The service starts with Stations of the Cross and then Pastors Bruce and Carolyn Gillette will be preaching in this worship service with other local pastors. 3) Heeding God’s Call to End Gun Violence’s Annual Good Friday Interfaith Stations and Walk in West & Southwest Philadelphia at Holy Apostles and Mediator Church (51st & Spruce Streets) starts at 4:30 p.m. (carpooling available earlier from Overbrook Presbyterian Church).



**Easter Sunday – April 1:** Our 10:30 a.m. worship service will include the gospel telling of the Easter story with Pastor Bruce Gillette’s sermon, “Unfinished Easter” and the sharing of the Lord’s Supper. It is all musical hands on deck for the most important day of the year! An extended period of preludes includes Bach’s Violin Sonata No. 2, played by Johnny May, and “Thine Is the Glory,” a setting of the popular hymn arranged by Margaret Tucker and presented by the Overbrook Westminster Handbell Choir. During

the service, the Overbrook Junior Choir will offer “That Easter Day with Joy Was Bright,” arranged by David Johnson, and the Overbrook Choir will sing Charles Villiers Stanford’s “Ye Choirs of New Jerusalem.” In addition, our soprano soloist, Iris Fairfax, will sing “I know that my redeemer liveth” from the *Messiah* of G. F. Handel. Finally, a beloved Overbrook tradition will continue as the “Hallelujah!” chorus, from the same work, is sung by the choir and congregation as a response to the benediction, concluding our joyful worship service celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Make plans to bring family, friends and neighbors to church during this Holy Week that is the most important week of the church year. Adults, youth and children are welcome. The good news of God’s love is for all people, of all ages, everywhere. Join us!

**Parking Reminder.** Remember, as we go into Holy Week, overflow parking is available in the Overbrook Train Station lot. There is no permit or fee needed on weekends. Please be considerate of those who need to park close to the church, and think about parking farther away if you are able.

## From Our Pastors: *Poems for the Most Important Week*

One of our favorite poets is a Presbyterian lay woman named Ann Weems. We have a number of her collections of poems that make good reading any time of the year.

*Kneeling in Jerusalem* is her collection of poems with Lenten and Easter themes (Westminster/John Knox Press, 1996). Here are a couple that speak to us. The first poem is good to reflect on in the days before you share in the Lord's Supper (especially this Maundy Thursday, March 29, and Easter Sunday, April 1).

The second poem reminds us why the days that begin with Palm Sunday/Passion Sunday (March 25 in 2018) and go through Easter Sunday (April 1) are so important. You might consider reading this poem each day of Holy Week.

Holy, consecrated, belonging to God...  
We move from hosannas to horror  
with the predictable ease  
of those who know not what they do.  
Our hosannas sung,  
our palms waved,  
let us go with passion into this week.  
It is time to curse fig trees that do not yield fruit,  
It is time to cleanse our temples of any blasphemy,  
It is time to greet Jesus as the Lord's Anointed One,  
to lavishly break our alabaster  
and pour perfume out for him  
without counting the cost.  
It is a time for preparation...  
The time to give thanks and break bread is upon us.  
The time to give thanks and drink of the cup is imminent.  
Eat, drink, remember:  
On this night of nights, each one must ask,  
as we dip our bread in the wine, "Is it I?"  
And on that darkest of days,

beneath the tree

The only road to Easter morning  
is through the unrelenting shadows of that Friday.  
Only then will the alleluias be sung;

## Worship/Music

I was touched and flattered that so many of the congregation stayed to listen to the extended organ music for our first **Postlude Sunday**; thank you for your support and encouragement! Our next extended postlude is on **Sunday, April 8**, during which I will play *Offertoire pour le jour de Pâques* ("Offertory for Easter Day") by Alexandre Pierre François Boëly, a French composer who lived during the nineteenth century. At that time, much of the Mass was sung in alternation between the choir and organ; however, the Offertory, or *Offertoire*, was for organ alone, and it was often a showcase for the instrument's brilliant capabilities. This particular piece is flashy, colorful, and dramatic, not to mention that it is based on the popular Easter hymn "O sons and daughters, let us sing" (*Glory to God* #235 and #255)—perfect for the season!

Finally, please make sure you have marked your calendars for the first concert of the Dennis Elwell Organ Recital Series, on **Sunday, May 6**, at **2:00 p.m.** Richard Elliott, organist of the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City, is a fantastic musician, and this concert is not to be missed. In the coming weeks, stay tuned for flyers and other promotional materials. 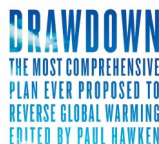


## Community

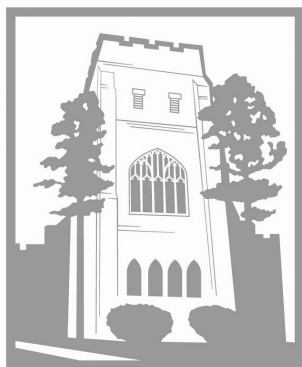

## Holy Week in the Study Catechism of the Presbyterian Church (USA)

**Question 32. What do you affirm when you say that he "suffered under Pontius Pilate"?**

First, that our Lord was rejected and abused by the authorities of that time, both religious and political. Second, and even more importantly, that he submitted to condemnation by an earthly judge so that we might be acquitted before our heavenly Judge.

**Question 33. What do you affirm when you say that he was "crucified, dead and buried"?**

From Christ's lonely and terrible death we learn that there is no sorrow he has not known, no grief he has not borne, and no price he was unwilling to pay in order to reconcile us to God.

**Question 34. What do you affirm when you say that he "descended into hell"?**

That our Lord took upon himself the full consequences of our sinfulness in order that we might be spared.

**Question 35. What do you affirm when you say that "on the third day he rose again from the dead"?**

Our Lord could not be held by the power of death. Having died on the cross, he appeared to his followers, and revealed himself to them as the Lord and Savior of the world.
