## ***Letter from the Pastor***

### **Astonishing Forgiveness**

If you read the story in John 8: 1-11, you will read the story of the woman taken in adultery. It is a familiar story, one often heard referenced. It is about a woman chased by the men in town through the streets of the town. She has been discovered to be an adulteress. The punishment for that was stoning. For what she did, death was the punishment; it was a capital offense.

The Scribes and the Pharisees brought her to Jesus and asked Jesus what should be done with her. It was a test to see if Jesus was faithful according to the law. It is then that Jesus makes His famous reply, "Let he who is without sin cast the first stone." Befuddled by Jesus' brilliant answer, the crowd disperses and returns home.

But that is not what is astonishing about that tale. What is astonishing is what happens after everyone goes away and leaves Jesus alone with the woman. His most astonishing words are not the ones quoted most frequently. What is astonishing is what he says to her next.

He says, "I do not condemn you." Truly astonishing.

There is no doubt about her guilt, but still He does not condemn her. She is forgiven for all that she has done. It is astonishing forgiveness. It is amazing grace.

It is astonishing because Jesus does not require anything of her before He forgives her. She never tells Him that she is sorry. She never promises not to do it again. Jesus never asks her to do these things before He forgives her. He steps between her and her death, and then forgives her with no admonishment or lecture, or even a requirement that she promise to reform her ways before forgiveness is given.

He just *forgives* her. Astonishing.

It is true that He then tells her not to do it again, but the deed is already done. The forgiveness is already given. No strings. No prior requirements. Just forgiveness, astonishing in its purity. Amazing in its grace.

Forgiveness is the glue of the Kingdom of God. It is the cement that holds it all together. Forgiveness allows us to look at ourselves in the mirror. Forgiveness makes it possible for us to repair broken relationships. Forgiveness teaches us mercy and compassion. Forgiveness is what is behind the words of the old hymn, "Just As I Am." Forgiveness is made believable by the Cross. Forgiveness is necessary for human life not be irrevocably shattered and atomized. Forgiveness is the bridge over which we walk to once again be united to God, ourselves, and each other.

What is astonishing about the forgiveness of God is that God forgives us *just as we are*. Astonishing.

During Lent this year, we will be talking a lot about the power and the nature of forgiveness in our lives, in our faith, and in our world. We will talk about one of the fundamental assumptions of our faith, and that is that there are no strings attached to the forgiveness of God. God forgives us, just as we are.

Astonishing.

# Worship & Music

## Music Series, 2016-2017

On Sunday, April 2, 2017 at 4:00 p.m. the three adult singing choirs from Ardmore Presbyterian Church, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, and Overbrook Presbyterian Church, will join together again to present a choral concert at Ardmore Presbyterian Church, 5 Montgomery Avenue in Ardmore. The three choirs began performing concerts together in the beginning of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, and have had a wonderful relationship musically and socially. With orchestra and organ, the choirs will present the *Solemne Vespers*, K.339, of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart; and the *Requiem*, Opus 9, of Maurice Duruflé. St. Paul's Choirmaster, Andrew Heller will conduct the Mozart, and Overbrook Minister of Music, Dennis Ewell, will conduct the Duruflé, with Gary Garletts, Music Director of Ardmore Presbyterian Church, organist. Soloists from each of the three churches will also be featured.

Mozart composed the *Solemn Vespers* in 1780. It is a work in six short movements, each utilizing chorus and soloists, and having been composed to be performed at Vespers in the Salzburg Cathedral. The first four movements are taken from Psalm texts. The fifth movement, often sung alone in anthem context, is a lyric, often tranquil Psalm setting of Psalm 147. The sixth movement features the Magnificat text, often a liturgical component of a Vespers service. Maurice Duruflé composed the *Requiem*, 40 years ago in 1947. It consists of nine short movements, depicting the sections of a Requiem Mass, beginning with an Introit/Kyrie, and concluding with In Paradisum, which ends on an unresolved dominant sev-enth chord, signifying eternity.

Members, relatives, and friends of the three congregations are invited and welcomed to enjoy this free musical opportunity. A free-will offering will be received to support the Music Programs of each church. Parking is available directly across the street from the church on Montgomery Avenue.

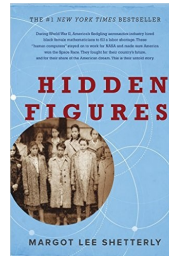


## Urban/Suburban Book Club

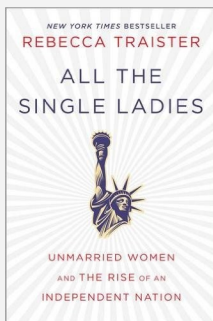

*All the Single Ladies* by Rebecca Traister



Traister explores the role of single women throughout modern history, some who worked as abolitionists, fought for voting rights, wrote literary classics, and kept the country running during wars. Unmarried women have been some of the most successful writers, activists and thinkers, and have also been ostracized, ridiculed and forced into unfulfilling unions. Traister is interested in the relatively new phenomenon of women having a choice whether to marry or not. "The revolution is in the lifting of the imperative that for centuries hustled nearly all (non-enslaved) women, regardless of their individual desires, ambitions, circumstances or the quality of available matches, down a single highway toward early heterosexual marriage and motherhood.

We once again, have an opportunity to accomplish two goals with one stroke – to enjoy a wonderful theatre experience besides raising funds towards OPC's operating budget.

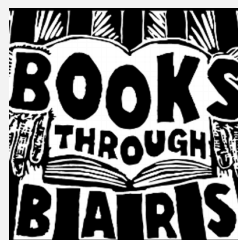


### INQUIRER'S CLASS

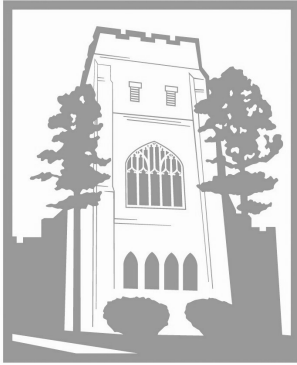
### Wednesday Morning Bible Study
